


A SNAPSHOT OF PRIORITIES & PERSPECTIVES

Libraries in the Netherlands



OCLC conducted a member survey to understand librarians' top priorities, current key initiatives, thoughts on service and top methods for keeping current on happenings in the library field.

Total respondents (n=152)

Most Dutch library staff:

- Anticipate the top reason users, students and faculty are using their library will change in five years
- Consider licensed electronic collections/e-books (academic library staff) and visibility of collections (public library staff) to be their top priorities
- Rely on library industry journals to keep informed about library trends.

Implementing discovery solutions is the most popular initiative for the current year.

Borrowing books and materials and completing assignments are perceived to be the top reasons users, students and faculty use the library today.


Use of the online library will increase


Over three-fourths of the Dutch library staff expect use of the online library to increase in the next two years.

Far fewer, however, expect an increase in foot traffic to their physical locations.

85% expect use of the online library will increase

22% expect use of the physical library will increase





User demand expected to change

Dutch academic library staff surveyed feel the primary reason faculty use the library is to borrow books and materials, and for students, the top reason is for completing assignments. Dutch public library staff believe the top reason for library use is to borrow books and materials.

Most expect those reasons to change over the next five years.

Anticipate a change in the top reason users, faculty and students use the library.

Increased demand for accessing online resources in 2017. Today, Dutch academic library staff indicate the primary reason faculty use the library is to access/borrow books/materials and the primary reason students use the library is to complete assignments. Dutch public library staff feel the primary reason users currently use the library is to access/borrow books/materials. The majority of Dutch library staff surveyed anticipate the primary reason users, faculty and students use the library will change in the next five years. Accessing online databases/journals is expected to be among the top reasons public library users, faculty and students use the library in 2017.

Accessing online databases/journals is expected to be among the top reasons for all three user groups.



Top priorities: visibility and e-content Top initiative: discovery

Dutch public libraries are focused on visibility and forming community partnerships as their top priorities. Dutch academic libraries are focused on licensed e-collections/ebooks as their first priority. Digital initiatives and implementing a discovery solution are among the top current initiatives among Dutch libraries.

Top priorities: Visibility of the library's collection and forming community partnerships are the top priorities for public library staff, while licensed electronic collections/e-books is the top priority for many academic library staff.

Journals keep library staff informed


Dutch library staff rely primarily on library industry journals to stay informed.
